Medicine: A Rewarding Career

The opening of the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in October 1893 represents a special milestone in the history of medical education in the United States. 1 This school, established as a graduate school within a young but already renowed university, required for admission a background of scientific training and competence measured by attainment of a bacculaureate degree or its equivalent. No other school in the country, at that time, had such high standards. Even more remarkable was the fact that suitably qualified women were to be admitted as students on the same basis as men. The historical records lead us to believe that these decsions were made with some reluctance and apprehension by the trustees, the President of the University, and some members of the senior staff of the Hospital which, at that time, included Dr. William Welch and Dr. William H. Osler. It was feared that the admission standards would be so high that no student would apply and the 'cosexual' instruction would be fraught with difficulty. However, the issue was forced by a group of unusual Baltimore women, deeply interested in higher education, who launched a national campaign and raised the half million dollars in endowment funds necessary to permit the opening of the Medical School. The two strong-minded women most responsible were Miss M. Carey Thomas, who became Professor of English, Dean, and later President of Bryn Mawr College; and Miss Mary E. Garrett, a canny busi-

ness woman, who herself contributed in excess of \$350,000 to the Fund. They would not back down in their positions. Their conditions were accepted and, with the success of the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine, their stand led to a major upgrading of medical education on a national scale. Thus, women have been well accepted in medicine at Johns Hopkins for many years.

From the beginning, the goals of the Johns Hopkins University for its medical school have reached beyond the training of competent practitioners of medicine to the development of leaders in the medical science, scientific research and training. Welch says of Osler ". . . he placed the student in a position by which he commanded the methods and instruments of study and enabled him to begin the lifelong self education which is the best result of medical teaching."²

Those early days must have been 'heady'ones, filled with the excitement of sharing in new accomplishments on many fronts: patient care, teaching, and the successful seeking for new knowledge. Although I came along too late to share the early days, I have had the privilege of sharing in the tradition they established.

Sweeping generalizations are apt to be dangerous, but in all honesty, I cannot conceive of a more satisfying career, for a bright person with a scientific orientation, than one with the general discipline of medicine. This field provides many and varied opportunities for service to others

and satisfaction to one's self. Powerful motivational reinforcement can be derived from the intellectual effort and challenge involved in the day-to-day problemsolving required. The problem confronting one may be: 1) how best to diagnose and treat the ills of the patient, 2) how best to promote the learnings of students, housestaff colleagues and of one's self, 3) how best to break new ground in research, or 4) how best to make the adminstrative machinery work smoothly for provision of medical care, teaching and the development of new knowledge. Each of the four general areas brings its own rewards in terms of interpersonal relationships, trust, the service involved in the alleviation of suffering, and the excitement which can come from solving problems.

Success and satisfaction in medicine has its price. It requires self-discipline and exacts a toll. For those ill-prepared intellectually, or unwilling to meet the obligations incurred, the toll may be a heavy burden. Medicine makes demands of dedication, sheer hard work and the ability to cope with frustrations and disappointment, well in excess of many other careers. The frustrations cannot be avoided; some patients will die in spite of one's best efforts, and promising reserach leads up a blind alley more often than not.

If one is fortunate enough to have the necessary intelligence and drive, a career in a specific area can be carved out to

Fellowship Winners for 1973-1974

The number of applicants for fellowships continues to rise with 171 presenting outstanding credentials this year as compared to 136 in 1972. Almost every conceivable career interest and profession appears in the applications. Among the 67 colleges and universities from which young women applied every part of the country was represented in both undergraduate training and prospective graduate study. Our Fellowship Winners this year and their plans for graduate study are described in the following paragraphs:

Janice Marlene Csokmay, awarded the Kathryn Sisson Phillips Fellowship, is a 1973 graduate of Bowling Green State University. She plans to attend UCLA where she will study Biomathematics. While an undergraduate she was active in Alpha Lambda Delta, Beta Beta Beta, and was president of Kappa Mu Epsilon, and president of Kappa Delta Pi. She was also a member of Phi Kappa Phi and the Mathematical Association of America, tutored Calculus, served as a member of a leukemia research group, and still found time to play in the BGSU Falcon Marching Band.

Dana Louann Simpson, awarded the Alice Crocker Lloyd Fellowship, graduated from the University of Oklahoma in 1973 where she majored in History. Miss Simpson wishes to prepare for a museum career and will continue her studies in History as a graduate at the University of Oklahoma. As an undergraduate she served on the Sonner Yearbook staff for three years, was an active member of Alpha Lambda Delta, was treasurer of her Mortar Board chapter, a member of Phi Alpha Theta, Tassels,

the French Club and the Baptist Student Union.

Betsy Ida Carter, a 1973 graduate of Wittenberg University is the recipient of the May Augusta Brunson Fellowship and plans to attend Duke University School of Law where she plans to study for her Doctor of Jurisprudence degree. During her undergraduate years she was a member of Alpha Lambda Delta, was Mortar Board chapter treasurer, a member of the Honors Program Committee, active in the Campus Women's Movement and served as a Freshman Counselor.

Charlotte E. Hovey has received the Maria Leonard Fellowship. Miss Hovey is a 1973 graduate of the University of Illinois where she studied pre-medical courses. She plans to attend Rush Medical College in Chicago for her MD degree. In her undergraduate years, Miss Hovey was a member of Omega Beta Pi Pre-Medical Fraternity, and active in Alpha Lambda Delta. She is also a member of the Art Institute of Chicago and Young Friends of the Arts of Chicago.

Diane Wood Van is the recipient of the Christine Yerges Conaway Fellowship. She received her BA from the University of Texas in 1971 and plans to study for her Doctor of Jurisprudence degree at the University of Texas School of Law. During her undergraduate years she was the Chairman of the Texas Union Coffee House Committee, a member of the Steering Committee on Orientation Procedures, served on the Texas Union Program Council, was a member of Cordettes an ROTC Auxiliary, and was selected 1970 Cactus Outstanding Student. Miss Van was also active in Alpha

Lambda Delta, receiving the Maria Leonard Book Award in 1971, and was elected to Mortar Board and Phi Beta Kappa.

Fiftieth Anniversary Fellowship Named for Miriam A. Shelden



Looking toward our 50th Anniversary year the National Council has established the seventh Fellowship to be named for Miriam A. Shelden.

Dean Shelden, now on leave from the University of Illinois, began her work there as Dean of Women in 1947, and more recently has been Dean of Student Personnel, Associate Professor of Higher Education and Associate Chancellor for Affirmative Action. Since the University

of Illinois was the birthplace of Alpha Lambda Delta, it seems particularly appropriate to honor a woman who has served that institution for twenty-six years. In addition she has served Alpha Lambda Delta as a District Advisor, as Secretary, and as Archivist since 1959.

Dean Shelden was a cum laude graduate of Russell Sage College, where some years later she was honored by receiving an Alumnae Medal for distinguished service. Her graduate degees were earned at New York University. Her teaching career began at Berea College and continued at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina.

During the war years she was Women's Reserve Director of Naval Air Commands in the U.S. and Hawaii. She rose to the rank of Commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve, and earned a Commendation

Ribbon for her work at naval air stations in Hawaii

Her professional activities have been many, one of which was President of the National Association of Women Deans and Counselors. She is a member of Delta Sigma Theta, Alpha Lambda Delta and Mortar Board.

The Fiftieth Anniversary Fellowship is available to Alpha Lambda Delta members who apply this year and will be awarded to an applicant for study in 1974-1975.

Plans for a year-long 50th birthday celebration in 1974 are underway and offer opportunity for every Alpha Lambda Delta chapter to participate. Since there will be over 180 chapters by the beginning of our anniversary year, think how many birthday candles will glow across the country!

meet one's personal preferences and needs. In certain specialties women, on the average, probably have advantages over men; for example, in pediatrics, obstetrics, and psychiatry the 'mother' figure may be especially useful.

The heavy demands in terms of time, dedication and energy required to obtain a medical training may pose problems. These seven or eight yeras (medical school and post graduate training) come at the point in life when most young women are starting their families. Success in medicine, marriage and motherhood, combined together, is not easy to achieve. It requires

a tolerant husband, compromises in social and sometimes professional matters, and a substantial measure of good fortune in obtaining adequate domestic help. The fact that the nature of family life and raising children makes more demands on the wife than the husband may be a more valid explanation than sex discrimination as to why there is a reasonable proportion of women in the lower academic ranks, but so few at the top.

With respect to sex discrimination, it is my belief that there is less in medicine than in most other professions, or in business. Perhaps this is because we have been around longer. I have seldom experienced it personally and I do not expect

to. It is my conviction that if one has a chip on one's shoulder, one will generate negative responses from others. A woman with the will and the ability to cope with the demands upon her can find in medicine a rewarding career.

Dr. Janet B. Hardy is Associate Professor, Pediatrics Director of the Johns Hopkins Collaborative Perinatal Study. A native of Canada, Dr. Hardy graduated with honors from the University of British Columbia and received her M.D. degree from McGill University. She has been Assistant Commissioner of Preventive Medicine for the city of Baltimore and is a Fellow of the American Public Health Association. She joined the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine staff in 1944 and became a U.S. citizen in 1949. A member of Sigma Xi, Dr. Hardy has written many papers and is currently working on a second book. She married while she was in medical school and has two children who are now in college.

THERE'S MANY A WAY TO SAY HAPPY BIRTHDAY

Variety characterizes the Fiftieth Anniversary Projects of Alpha Lambda Delta chapters across the country. From every District, chapters are promoting the goals and purposes of Alpha Lambda Delta through projects that involve their campuses and communities. Involvement definitely seems to be the key word for these active women.

Individual chapter projects range from community activities to campus improvement plans and career seminars for undergraduate women. Among the proposed speakers for such a seminar at the University of Texas at El Paso is Mrs. Lyndon Johnson. Another chapter has its sociology department involved in helping with a similar program. These chapters plan to increase awareness of all women students of the professional opportunities for women,

especially those with college educations. De Pauw's chapter described the situation by saying: "Too many women students do not realize the tremendous variety of career opportunities, and are not well informed about the fields that used to be exclusively for men but are now open to women."

The chapter at Clemson University plans to send a newsletter to their alumnae in order to foster relations between current and past members. Other chapters plan to reach high school students to provide information and encourage scholarship. Several chapters of Alpha Lambda Delta plan to honor the faculty member whom chapter members feel has been the most encouraging and stimulating during fresh (wo) man year. Women faculty-of-the-month awards, and recognition for outstanding women

students at campus-wide Women's Weeks are proposed anniversary projects for other campuses.

Individual campus-oriented projects include the anniversary gift of a much needed new world globe for the library at Hanover College, a "Scholar Shop" white elephant-bake sale at Vanderbilt to raise money for a freshman scholarship, and "Project: Sidewalk," cosponsored by Alpha Lambda Delta and Mortar Board at Butler University. This project is a campus service to provide a sidewalk over a frequented area that is always muddy when it rains. The Northwestern State chapter in Louisiana plans to plant azaleas as a campus beautification project and to be a living tribute to retiring Dean of Women, Mrs. Lucile Hendrick, who (Continued on page 8)

THIRTY-FIVE YEARS OF FELLOWSHIPS

The story of fellowships for Alpha Lambda Delta members began in 1939 when the National Council, having decided against the expensive practice of holding conventions, placed \$500.00 in a fund to send a young woman to graduate school. In 1940 Louise Houssiere was elected to begin work on a Master of Science degree in geology at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, thus having the honor of being the first Alpha Lambda Delta Fellowship winner. Through the years, sixtyfour other young women have held fellowships representing gifts of nearly \$110,000.00.

Between the years of 1942-1948. awards were suspended and War Bonds were purchased to provide additional money for future fellowships. In 1948, the earlier \$500.00 award was increased to \$750.00, in 1960 to \$1,000.00, in 1962 to \$1,500.00, and four years later to \$2,000.00. Not only has the amount of the awards increased, but the number of fellowships given has grown. In1960 two fellowships were awarded to Barbara A. Fleck, a graduate of the University of Omaha who studied mathematics at the University of Michigan, and to Diane Sue Bolinger, a Purdue graduate who continued her studies in Home Economics at her alma mater. These two fellowships honored Alice Crocker Lloyd, Vice President of the National Council and the first chairman of the Fellowship Awards Committee, and Adele Hagner Stamp, National Treasurer of Alpha Lambda Delta for eighteen years.

The Maria Leonard Fellowship was established in 1961 in honor of the founder and first President of the honor society, the Kathryn Sisson Phillips Fellowship was first awarded in 1965, and the Christine Y. Conaway Fellowship was first given the following year. Mrs. Phillips was a distinguished educator and the first president of the National Association of Deans of Women; Mrs. Conaway was the first editor of the Flame and served on the National Council for fourteen years.

In 1970 Dean May Brunson died while in office as National President and a sixth fellowship was established and named for her. This year, the 50th Anniversary Fellowship is being awarded for study in 1974-1975 and honors

Miriam A. Shelden who has served on the National Council for fourteen years as a District Advisor, as Secretary and as Archivist.

Fellowship winners have been chosen from thirty-nine colleges and universities in the United States including Hawaii, and applications each year have increased to over two hundred this fall. Almost every conceivable field of study has been among those pursued by fellowship holders, with medicine leading the list, law second in popularity and teaching being the career aspiration of many. National Council meeting a change in the purpose of Alpha Lambda Delta as stated in the constitution was proposed. Subsequently all chapters were asked to vote on the revision according to procedure for adoption of amendments to the constitution.

One hundred and one Alpha Lambda Delta chapters returned ballots and supported the proposed constitutional change by one hundred affirmative votes. Article II now reads: "The purpose of the society shall be to encourage superior scholastic attainment among women in their first year in institutions of higher learning, and to assist women students in recognizing and developing meaningful goals for their unique roles in society."

The significance of the revision lies in the broadening of purpose to cover more adequately the hopes and aspirations of today's college women.



helped organize their chapter. The chapter at Anderson College in Indiana plans to disseminate information about the University's Student Summer Service which sends students "all over the world in an effort to teach students that service and education most often go together."

Community-oriented projects are also equally varied. One chapter proposes to buy books as outside reading material for the local first grade, and start a tutoring program for elementary students. Educational toys for a student government Day Care Center for children of student-parents is another proposal the chapter feels is helping promote the education of both parents and

children. Part of the Western Carolina University chapter's project is working with Youth Association for Retarded Children in "Special Olympics" programs. Alpha Lambda Delta at Tift College and Valdosta State University have similar projects in which handicapped children have the opportunity to participate in active sports. The chapter at Winthrop College plans to adopt foster grandparents at a local nursing home.

Another proposal involves an issue of national importance—the energy crisis. Clemson's Alpha Lambda Delta chapter plans to assist the University commission for the conservation of energy by placing conservation reminders throughout the campus and com-

munity. Their project is most aptly to be called "Think Smart."
