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Margaret Berry Becomes National President

Elected to be the ninth National President of Alpha Lambda Delta at the June, 1975 Council meeting, Margaret C. Berry began her term of office at the end of the 1976 Council meeting. Dr. Berry has been at the University of Texas, Austin since 1962 and is currently undertaking a special assignment as the Director of the University Writings Collection and Assistant Director of the University History Project.

Margaret Berry has played leadership roles all her life. A native of Texas, she began by being a high school valedictorian; she then went to Austin where she graduated from the University with honors having majored in history and minored in government. In addition to membership in Alpha Lambda Delta. Mortar Board, Pi Lambda Theta, and Phi Alpha Theta, she was president of the Co-Ed Assembly her senior year. It is not surprising that she was listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities.

Dr. Berry took graduate degrees at Columbia University: a master's in history, and her doctorate in student personnel administration. Her subsequent professional experiences have included high school teaching, directing testing programs, being a registrar, dean of women, associate dean of students, author, and editor of award-winning publications. Cited for "excellence in educational journalism," the Journal of the National Association for Women Deans, Administrators and Counselors has won awards in 1974 and 1975 given by the Educational Press Association. In June, 1975 Dr. Berry's book UT Austin Traditions and Nostalgia was published.

In community affairs Margaret Berry is the first woman to serve as chairman of the Administrative Board of the University United Methodist Church. She

has served on numerous committees and been an officer of the Texas Association of Student Personnel Administrators. Other active memberships include: Delta Kappa Gamma, American College Personnel Association, and the Texas and National Associations for Women Deans, Administrators and Counselors.

Dr. Berry begins her seventh year of service to Alpha Lambda Delta. In 1970 she was a District Adviser and was elected First Vice-President the following year. We are fortunate indeed to have the leadership of Margaret C. Berry in the office of National President.

Two Chapters Will Be Installed In 1976-1977

Alpha Lambda Delta will add two more chapters to its roster with the installation of one at Roanoke College, Salem, Virginia, and another at Georgia Southwestern College at Americus, Georgia. These installations will bring the number of chapters in District I (Atlantic States) to twenty-five, and in District II (Southeast) to thirty-three. New Council Members

Joining the National Council as Adviser to District III is Marilou Osinske, Associate Dean for Student Development at the University of Cincinnati. With degrees from the University of Illinois and Indiana University,



she has continued her study at the Universities of Wisconsin, Cincinnati, and Michigan.

Her experience has covered such varied fields as public relations, economic analysis, editorial work, residence hall and student union administration, and at the University of Wisconsin she was Assistant to the Theater Program Director. In this position she not only supervised "back of the house" mainstage operations, but handled advertising, news releases, program designing as well as arranged transportation and entertainment for visiting artists.

Dean Osinske serves on a variety of committees as well as performs many research and editorial functions for the University. In the larger community she is a member of the Ohio Commission on the Status of Women and is active in the Ohio and the National Associations of Deans, Administrators and Counselors. She belongs to the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, the American Association of Higher Education, Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, and is listed in Who's Who of American Women. Last year she served as a Consultant and Resource Person for the Intercollegiate Association of Women Students.

She held membership in Phi Kappa Phi and Kappa Delta Pi. One of ten outstanding students of the University, Cheemin has been very active in local and state activities also. She has been a member of the International Association of Students in Economics and Management and hopes to receive a master's degree in international business administration. With background of an undergraduate major in art education, and having studied at the Institute of Chinese Culture, Cheemin will surely reach her ambition to "assist and expose the cultural uniqueness of China and improve relations between the East and the West."

THE INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S YEAR FELLOWSHIP

From the University of Maine we honor Georgia Anne Tuttle who indicated on her application a double-barrelled M.D.-Ph.D. program toward a medical career. Georgia's present concern is better medical care for people in small communities and is considering a general practice. She was elected to Phi Beta Kappa in her junior year, and was selected for both local and national Delta Delta Delta scholarship awards as well as one given by Phi Kappa Phi. She participated as a representative in inter-dormitory government. Perhaps her performance as an athlete provides a truly outstanding record: track events, basketball, volleyball, softball, scuba diving (she was vice-president and treasurer of the club), and varsity field hockey were all a part of her undergraduate years. Added to her high academic credentials of membership in Alpha Lambda Delta, Phi Kappa Phi, and Beta Beta Beta, is an astonishing variety of activities in which she has participated. Among them are: theater group, swim team, Academic Policies Committee, Judicial Board Review Committee, and Alpha Gamma Delta sorority. Although the number of fellowships has increased to ten this year, committee members will attest to the fact that the selection process from the total field of highly qualified talent applying is a formidable task. After ten recipients are selected, if any one of them receives substantial financial aid from other sources, the recipient is then named an Honor Fellow, and monies available in that particular fund are passed on to another applicant.

Such was the case this year with Suzanne Y. McDonald, an outstanding 1976 graduate of the University of

Illinois at Chicago Circle. Her major was psychology and she held office in the Black Students Psychological Association. In her junior year she received honor's recognition, and her degree was

KATHRYN SISSON PHILLIPS **FELLOWSHIP**



In June, 1970, Dean Cuninggim was elected to the Alpha Lambda Delta National Council, effective in 1971. She was named District II Adviser and Flame Editor in 1972 and Archivist in 1974. Her most recent activities have included writing the fifty-year history of Alpha Lambda Delta and installing chapters at Tennessee Technological University and Maryville College.

Dean Cuninggim's other affiliations include the American Association of University Women, National Association of Women Deans, Administrators and Counselors, Tennessee Association of Women Deans (president 1958-60), Kappa Pi, Theta Alpha Phi, Pi Lambda Theta, Mortar Board, and Kappa Alpha Theta. In Memoriam

As the National Council gathered for its annual meeting June 16, the first thoughts and concern of Council members were to honor the memory of Jean Stouffer, Adviser to District VII, who had died only two weeks prior to the meeting. Jean had joined the Council in 1973; yet in that one term of service, the qualities of her life deeply influenced all of us privileged to know and work with her.

Jean had served Fort Hays State University in Hays. Kansas since 1955 as dean of women and associate professor of business, and more recently as associate dean of students. She was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Kansas, and later a member of its alumni board of directors. Her master's degree in social sciences was awarded by Syracuse University. She was a member of Mortar Board as well as Alpha Lambda Delta and Delta Kappa Gamma, and was active in the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, the Kansas and the National Associations of Women Deans, Administrators and Counselors. She was the first woman to receive the Phi Delta Kappa M. C. Cunningham Award for outstanding service to education.

Dean Jean, as she was known at

Fort Hays, was greatly beloved not only there, but in many other communities by colleagues and friends throughout the nation. The words of a co-worker shared with us at National Council meeting paid eloquent tribute and expressed our feelings: "It is hard to accept the fact that Jean will not be here to add the vitality, vision and joy to our days any more. However, we are all the richer for the exemplary life she lived among us. I am certain we can honor her memory best by dedicating our lives to strive for the high ideals by which she lived. We can never replace her, but we can keep the memory of this beautiful lady forever in our hearts and be better persons for it."



Alpha Lambda Delta's First President, Dr. Maria Leonard, Dies in California

Dr. Maria Leonard, former Dean of Women at the University of Illinois, Urbana/Champaign, died at ninety-six on October 31, 1976 at her home in Livermore, California. Those who knew this distinguished educator, writer, and world-traveller would agree that she lived a full, productive life and saw the harvest of what she had sowed.

Maria Leonard was born in Indianapolis in 1880 of a family prominent in religious activities. Her father was a Sunday School teacher, her mother a church soloist, and her grandfather was pastor of a large Methodist congregation in Cincinnati.

In her early years, Miss Leonard studied voice and was graduated in 1906 from Butler University. By 1910 she had a Master's degree from Colorado College in the field of mathematics and planned to become a teacher. Her first teaching position began that year at the University of Idaho. Friends convinced her to enter the new field of educational administration, and in 1912 she became Dean of Women at Coe College. In 1923 she became Dean of Women at the University of Illinois in Urbana; there she remained for 22 years until she retired in 1945. During this time she was presented an honorary Doctor of Literature degree from Coe College.

At the University of Illinois she founded Alpha Lambda Delta, an honorary scholastic organization for freshman college women. This organization celebrated its fiftieth anniversary in 1974, and now has one hundred and ninety-four chapters throughout the United States.

In the early days Dean Leonard's staff of assistants helped to maintain a strong and growing organization, and on the original charter Assistant Dean Gladys Pennington, (now Mrs. Arthur Houser), is listed as a co-founder.

Dr. Leonard travelled extensively in Europe and was twice around the world as well as having numerous trips to Africa, and far away places in both North and South America. In 1936 as a national delegate to the World Congress of Business and Professional Women's clubs in Paris she said in an address, "Women are the greatest unused power in the world." That same year she also addressed the International Federation of University Women in Cracow, Poland.

During World War II she was involved in recruitment activities for the WAC, WAVES and Women Marines. the war and her retirement, she and her friend, Dr. Maude Lee Etheredge moved to Palo Alto, California to live; and Dr. Leonard began a new career of author. Pursuing a life-long devotion to religious studies, she wrote "Bible Truth for Today's Youth," published in 1964. Although it was primarily written for young people, it appealed to persons of all religions and gave scholarly insight to the Bible and an analysis of the relationships of the three major monotheistic religions.

Found in the Archives at the University of Illinois is a motto for Alpha Lambda Delta members believed to have been prepared by Dean Leonard for a favor at a special occasion when she was Grand President. If all members could

Goodbye Typewriter, Hello World

She did not march in the streets. Nor did she take any other active role in the women's movement, though she genuinely admired those who did.

Instead, June 1974 graduate Sheila Ann Ames worked hard and long, quietly proving that women are not physically or mentally inferior, and opting for a diploma "with highest distinction" from a very tough school.

Sheila readily admits those three beautiful words have given her a new sense of self-respect. And more importantly, fortified a slow-to-develop, if not waning, sense of worth.



What's more, this attractive 33-yearold secretary with the perfect 6.0 record was a most outstanding role-model at Purdue University for female liberationists. This is evidenced by glowing testimonials coming from the Office of the Dean of Students and from colleagues where she worked in the School of Agriculture.

"When she first came here to work, we saw she had great talent and ability," says her former boss, Professor John Dunbar. "I have such a strong belief that the way for people to have successful lives is through education that I encouraged her to go ahead and do undergraduate work." Purdue's program director for cooperative extension goes on: "Throughout her career as a student, she pursued her educational goals with great intensity and yet was able to maintain an excellent balance between school work and as my half-time secretary."

It's not that the articulate Sheila ever suffered from an identity crisis ("I knew what I wanted, but I figured I'd missed it a long time back") but she does admit she's learned a lot of hard lessons since she left high school in Old Greenwich, Conn.

Another two years in a private girls

school, away from her brother, Bill, and sister, Nancy, did little to assure her she was an "equal" human being, and college entrance exams only added to her confusion.

Her scores were not outstanding, she says, but she was frightened of, and hated the tests.

Glossing over her obvious academic potential, the results indicated she perhaps would be a fine candidate for secretarial school.

And so that is how the late-blooming scholar became a graduate of Catherine Gibbs in New York and Boston, a twoyear liberal arts and secretarial school.

Successful there, Mrs. Ames went on to work for the Central Intelligence Agency in Washington. Then, while traveling with her husband in the Air Force she had many stimulating jobs she thoroughly enjoyed.

Once she taught typing and comprehensive and speed reading to Air Force men and their dependents in Newfoundland. And she was given even more responsibility and respect while working with a Washington housing

development organization.

When Sheila's husband came to Purdue to take a master's degree in industrial administration, the couple took a close look at their flailing marriage; this scrutiny resulted in divorce. Sheila had ambivalent feelings about herself, frustration and guilt, but by the time of graduation she felt fully recovered from feelings of insecurity and inadequacy, attributing her recovery to the help of God and so many supportive teachers and friends. Reflecting on her educational experience in a recent letter Sheila says her Purdue years were a wonderful combination of "caring and excellence." Certainly anything I've accomplished must be spread out among a lot of people. Particularly my boss - and Purdue Financial Aids where they gave me help nearly every year."

And what about those courses, or teachers, Sheila didn't like? "I just considered those to be courses in self-discipline," she said, philosophically.

Articulating her concern for the world we live in, Sheila speaks warmly about her two-year stint as a volunteer worker with Lafayette's Crisis Center.

"So many youngsters are almost beyond help. By the time they are 15
