Landmark Decision Adds Collegiate Members to the National Council

Attending the National Council meeting this summer in Sea Island, Georgia was a valuable experience for each of us. In those few days we gained a tremendous amount of knowledge about Alpha Lambda Delta.

We discovered the many functions of the council and the importance of its annual meeting. A wide variety of topics was covered at the meeting — from changes in the insignia to revisions in the rules for chartering new chapters. We were impressed by the fact that every detail in the constitution, bylaws and handbook was meticulously reviewed.

All policy changes were discussed at length with the pros and cons carefully weighed. They were open to any suggestions and ideas that would benefit the organization. This was proven by their decision to begin electing four students to serve on the Council for two-year terms.

This decision is hailed as a landmark in Alpha Lambda Delta's fifty-three year history! The student delegates will

They will be able to discuss problems that have arisen in their chapters or nearby chapters with National Council. In addition, we believe the chapters will feel closer to the Council knowing that students are representing them at meetings.

We applaud the National Council members, not only for this decision, but for the fine job they are doing. Our organization could not run so smoothly if it were not for the devoted professional women serving as Council members. Our thanks and appreciation are extended to them for giving us the opportunity to participate and contribute in an important way to Alpha Lambda Delta's history.



taking office in June, 1970. After serving two terms, Council asked her to be a Consultant. Her expertise during these transition years has been invaluable to the Society.

At Auburn University, where she is serving her thirty-second year, she is especially distinguished for having been presented an Algernon Sydney Sullivan Her contributions, however, extend far beyond her university campus. She has served in many leadership positions and been a distinguished representative of Alpha Lambda Delta attending many meetings of the Association of College Honor Societies. She now is on the executive committee of that organization. Dr. Cater was an undergraduate at Limestone College, Gaffney, South Carolina and was awarded a doctor of letters from that institution. Her other degrees were from Mercer and Syracuse Universities. In addition to this Alpha Lambda Delta fellowship she has an AAUW grant named for her.

The tenth fellowship has been named for Margaret Louise Cuninggim who joined the Council in 1971 and has served as District II Adviser, Editor of The Flame and Archivist. It was her privilege to examine all the original documents prior to the 50th Anniversary celebration, and from her study of these files she gathered the material to write the history of the Society. This was published in the fall of 1975. Dr. Cuninggim was cited last year by NAWDAC for forty years of service in higher education having begun a teaching career at Alabama College, Montevallo and later becoming a Dean at Ripon, Wisconsin, Hockaday in Dallas, Texas and three institutions in her native state, Tennessee: Technological University, the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, and Vanderbilt University. Her degrees were from Duke. Columbia and Northwestern Universities.



Following the seminar on Saturday morning, the participants, Dean Grady, and sponsors Dean Virginia Crump and Professor Mary Ellen Proudfit attended a luncheon. At the conclusion of the meal, Dean Grady challenged each woman to adhere to a self-contract for change.

Dean Viola Grady holds degrees from the University of Southern California. She draws her expertise in the area of human relations from study, participation in workshops, and experience in directing seminars on the topic.
