She is the Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Higher Education of the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women in Maryland, and a member of the Women's Committee of the President's Committee on the Employment of the Handicapped. National Council Report

The National Council of Alpha Lambda Delta held its annual meeting June 27-July 1, 1979 at Sea Island, Georgia. Significant actions of the Council included:

- 1. Approval of funding for twelve \$2500 fellowships of 1980-81.
- 2. Approval of funding for a Workshop in District VIII (see report on page 3 of this issue of *The Flame*.) These workshops are planned in order to provide more service to collegiate chapters and individual members.
- 3. Approval of an active expansion program for Alpha Lambda Delta with new chapters to be installed at Salem College and Pennsylvania State University at Altoona.
- 4. Approval of a By-Law change which would permit Juniors and Seniors to continue as active, voting members of Alpha Lambda Delta. The Council retained the provision that "Offices will be held by sophomore members, with the exception of the Junior and/or Senior Advisers."
- 5. Expression of appreciation to Margaret Berry for her outstanding service and leadership as National President.

Be A Student Representative To National Council

Student representatives have proven to be invaluable participants in the deliberations of Alpha Lambda Delta National Council. They serve for two years and are obligated to attend the four-day meetings of National Council each June during their term of office. They may participate within their particular districts through editing a district newsletter, writing letters to chapter presidents to offer help or assistance, helping to organize a regional workshop, working with the district adviser in coordinating communication among chapters, and visiting chapters to offer assistance and encouragement.

If you have been an active member of one year and are interested in applying for a position as a Student Representative, contact the president of your local chapter, who has the application forms. The application deadline for the two positions open for 1980-81 is February 15, 1980. You, too, would find the kind of experience which this participation has given Kim Hinshaw: "... the National Council Meeting opened my eyes about myself and my future goals. I've made some decisions as to my path in life this summer with happiness and interesting work at the top of the list."

"Melting the Melting Pot."

The second tradition is carried out toward the end of the academic year, during the University's Honors Night Convocation. The Jackson State University Chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta presents the "Outstanding Parent(s) Award" to the parent or parents who exemplify sacrifice, courage, dedication and love in the face of adverse circumstances, lack of affluence, and in some cases, limited formal education. Disclosure of the name of the parent or parents selected is not made until the award is presented by the president of the chapter and the faculty advisor, and great care is taken to insure the presence at the Convocation of those honored, who are kept unaware of their selection until the presentation. The most recent recipient of the "Outstanding Parent Award"

were the parents of eleven children, nine of whom had graduated from college. Neither one of the parents had finished high school or attended college.

Traditions may serve as supportive pillars of an institution, or be symbolic links with past experiences, or embody cherished values worth transmitting. EMPHASIS ON SERVICE

In keeping with the purpose of Alpha Lambda Delta, local chapters have taken on a variety of service projects. Projects include efforts to improve library holdings, recognize and encourage scholastic achievement, provide services to fellow students and assist those in the local community. Service projects at the University of Mississippi, University of Alabama, University of Florida, Central State University and Wittenburg University are highlighted in this issue of *The Flame*. Other service projects are described in the chapter reports on pages 6 and 7.

The UNIVERSITY OF MISSIS-SIPPI chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta freshman honorary collected \$455 during 1979 for its continuing "One Book at a Time Library Effort." The donation represents \$15 contributions from various campus organizations. The 1979 donation exceeds by 15 percent the total contributed during the previous year.

The UNIVERSITY OF ALABAMA Chapter sponsored the second annual

Tuscaloosa County Honors night for seniors from local high schools who were in the top 5 percent of their class. Susan Opel, the Chapter's Secretary, planned and coordinated the program. Dr. Charley Scott, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs, also participated as a speaker. More than one hundred and fifty parents and students attended. Honors Night not only recognizes the academic achievements of these high school seniors but also introduces them to Alpha Lambda Delta.

Continuing their previous projects of serving free coffee outside of the library during finals' dead week and donating free printed schedule sheets at registration, members of Alpha Lamba Delta at the UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA have undertaken the problem of combating high textbook prices on campus. Beginning last spring, the officers have worked on a BOOK LOAN project. The idea behind this project is that students turn in their old textbooks in return for credits which

are recorded in a file so that they may check out other books that are needed for the new quarter. Their system has been set up so that students may use the BOOK LOAN for as long as they wish with their orginial credits on file.

At the present time, they have not officially begun our operation, but are now collecting used books from students and are looking into the possibility of purchasing new textbooks with our own financing.

The tutor Referral Service is the "great experiment" of the year for the CENTRAL STATE UNIVERSITY chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta. In past years, members of Alpha Lambda Delta have offered to give free tutoring service. However, complaints were received because, for example, a sophomore member of Alpha Lambda Delta could not adequately tutor a senior chemistry major.

It was then suggested that Alpha Lambda Delta try working as a referral service which could locate a qualified tutor for a needing tutee. To handle the workload of the project, members were divided into committees.

The recruiting committee had the responsibility of gathering the names of qualified tutors. The reference committee would check the qualifications and recommendations of each of the applicants. The job for the publicity committee was to make prospective students aware and informed of the program. The evaluation committee will evaluate the program and make recommendations for the future.

Although the Tutor Referral Service will probably be only a "great experiment" for this year, the project has helped unite members through a common goal, brought Alpha Lambda Delta to campus attention and paved the way for similar projects in the future.

Alpha Lambda Delta participated in the organizational fair, the President's Christmas Party for Underprivileged Children and the President's Reception for Freshmen and Transfer Students.

Other chapter activities included delivering "Do Not Disturb" signs to the dormitories and naming an outstanding faculty person who suggested the book to be donated to the library.

Members also found that any holiday is an excuse for caroling. At Halloween, Alpha Lambda Delta delivered boxes of fruit to two nursing homes and sang pumpkin carols up and down the halls.

Some programs planned by the group are a Reading Club at a Toledo elementary school to aid remedial readers, cultural trips to area theatrical productions, a spring formal, and sending "care packages" to dorm students during exam week.

CLEMSON UNIVERSITY South Carolina

The Clemson University chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta has been very active during the Fall semester under the guidance of Paula Niemer. The chapter started in August by sponsoring a Freshman Drop-in at the Alumni Center. The purpose of this drop-in was to aid the freshmen in becoming acquainted with the campus and its activities. Later in September, Alpha Lambda Delta had another big success by sponsoring a cook-out at East Bank for its members. As the semester ended, Alpha Lambda Delta concluded their activities with initiation for its new members in December. UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI Oxford, Mississippi

At the University of Mississippi Alpha Lambda Delta stepped-up its campus relations to become a working freshman honorary.

The spring initiates of Alpha Lambda Delta hosted a swap with Phi Eta Sigma for Ole Miss freshmen in mid-November. At the swap, some 150 freshmen having a 3.0 g.p.a. at midterm were acquainted with the qualifications and aims of both freshman honoraries.

Dr. David G. Sansing, associate professor of history at Ole Miss, was guest speaker for the swap. worse qualities."

Sansing's talk concluded with a reading from *The Prophet* by Kahil Gibran. Sansing said this piece should serve as a guide to an individual seriously attempting critical self-analysis.

In a reception following Sansing's speech, freshmen had a chance to talk with both Alpha Lambda Delta and Phi Eta Sigma members about their organizations. A display organized by Alpha Lambda Delta members showed the leadership positions filled by its members at Ole Miss and the freshman subject tutorial service in which contact can be made by phone.

CENTRAL MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY Mt. Pleasant, Michigan

Last semester Central Michigan University chapters of Alpha Lambda Delta and Phi Eta Sigma combined forces to Trick-Or-Treat for U.N.I.C.E.F. at Halloween and go Christmas Caroling before Christmas break. The initiation was held in the Guild Lounge of Scott Hall, and underneath glimmering chandeliers of cut-glass the newest members of the Northwestern Chapter were treated to an hour long service by such dignitaries as Dr. Jim G. Carle-Vice President for Student Affairs, Professors Michael Graham and John B. Meixner of the political science and philosophy departments, respectively, and Mr. John P. McGowan, University Librarian. Dr. Carleton, who was this year's guest of honor, gave the opening address in which he urged the assembled students to pursue their studies with the same, "earnest and dedication that you have already shown." The Northwestern Chapter then had the honor of initiating four honorary members. Chapter President Robert Jarvis commended Professors Graham, Meixner,

and Steven D. Martinson, of the German department and current chapter faculty advisor, and Assistant Dean of Students Margo P. Brown, current chapter liaison administrator, for "their proven devotion to fostering an on-going exchange of ideas dialogue between students faculty." Next, Dean Brown gave a speech on the Northwestern chapter and urged everyone to attend Elections & Awards Night, which this year will be held on April 17. After the initiation of the candidates and the traditional lighting of the flame, Professor Graham gave the keynote address. He urged students to, "pursue excellence, for when you pursue excellence, you are serving yourself and your fellow students." Professor Martinson then announced that the Scholarship Committee, which is being chaired this year by Dean Brown, had voted to present \$600 in scholarships to new members. The grand award is a \$200 U.S. Savings Bond, and will be awarded to the sophomore demonstrating the, "highest ideals of leadership." The award is named for Dr. Ann Eppert, past vice president of National Alpha Lambda Delta, and is this year dedicated to Mrs. Robert H. Strotz, wife of Northwestern University president Robert H. Strotz. The winner will also have his or her name permanently displayed on a plaque to be established during spring quarter on campus. There are four other awards, each worth \$100.00 in U.S. Savings Bonds, which will be given in the areas of campus leadership, community service, academic distinction, and athletic achievement.

Perhaps the highlight of the evening came when chapter treasurer Elisabeth L. Demonchaux presented the Annual Gift. This year, the gift was a \$300.00 check, and was awarded to the University Library to increase the library's humanities holdings. University Librarian John P. McGowan accepted the check, and called on students to, "support the library. Hopefully, others will follow the Alpha Lambda Delta example and contribute as

generously." The ceremony ended with Professor Meixner giving the closing address. In his speech, he called on students to, "continue to challenge yourself from without and within."

Of 383 students eligible to join Alpha Lambda Delta, 297 did so. This represents a 100% increase over last year, and is the largst class ever taken by the Northwestern Chapter. In addition, the chapter awarded \$600 in scholarships, up 20% from last year. Finally, a new Recognition program was instituted, in which all new members who had achieved a cumulative grade point average of 4.0 during their freshman year were awarded certificates at initiation.
