- Dean Dorothy Anderson, National President 1991-1997





Executive Director Adviser Awards

t the 1998 National Council, a new award was created to recognize outstanding advisers. "The role of the chapter adviser is critical to the success of the chapter and the national organization," said Dr. Jim Stemler, Vice President for Chapter Relations and Expansion. "That's why the Chapter Relations Committee recommended the establishment of the Executive Director Adviser Awards so that more chapter advisers could be recognized for their service and commitment to Alpha Lambda Delta."

Eileen Stewart, University of Massachusetts

Ms. Eileen Stewart, Assistant Dean of Students at the



University of Massachusetts has served as ALD adviser since 1988. This year the chapter experienced a membership increase of over 240% from 89 to 304 new members! "It is very unusual to have a chapter increase membership that dramatically in one year," said Executive Director, Dr. Earwood-Smith.

Gale Richardson, Texas Tech University

Since 1980, Gale Richardson, Director of Official Publications at Texas Tech University has served as ALD chapter adviser. Gale Richardson also served Alpha Lambda Delta as a member of the National Council from



1984 to 1986 and as editor of the FLAME from 1985 to 1991. Always one of the larger ALD chapters, the Texas Tech University chapter initiated a group of 434 students into Alpha Lambda Delta last year. The chapter officers nominated Gale Richardson for the National Outstanding Adviser of the Year Award.

Jo Ann Schrass, George Mason University

Harrison Greenlaw and Lucille Mould, University of South Carolina

The University of South Carolina, which won the Order



of the Torch Award again this year, is fortunate to have two strong advisers. Mr. Harrison Greenlaw, selected as National Outstanding Adviser of the Year in 1996-97 has served as



chapter adviser at the University of South Carolina since 1987 in addition to his responsibilities as Director of Orientation and Testing. The Flame is pleased to provide Executive Director Glenda Earwood-Smith's introduction and brief biography of Ms. Strug.

It gives me great pleasure to introduce to you, one of

your college peers and fellow Alpha Lambda Delta members - Kerri Strug.

Kerri was born in Tuscon, Arizona in 1977. Inspired by her older brother and sister's involvement in gymnastics, she began taking lessons when she was three. When Kerri was six, she watched Mary Lou Retton win a gold medal at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics and decided that one day she could do the same! At age 13, she left home and moved to Houston to train full-time with Bela and Martha Karolyi, the coaches of prior Olympic gold medalists Nadia Comaneci and Mary Lou Retton. That same year, Kerri became the youngest female to win a U.S. Gymnastics title when she took first place in the vault. At age 14, Kerri became the youngest member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Women's Gymnastic team. The team took home the bronze medal from the Olympic Games in Barcelona. By 1996, Kerri was one




of the oldest members of the 1996
U.S. Olympic Women's Gymnastic's
Team which won the first gold
medal in Olympic history.
It was that Olympic competition

It was that Olympic competition that I first found out about Kerri Strug. You see I was one of the 32,000 people in Atlanta Georgia Dome to see the women's gymnastic meet. The competition was

quite intense and fierce between the U.S. Women's team and the Russian gymnastics team. While the USA was in the lead most of the afternoon, the score separating the USA from Russia was very close. The Americans led going into the final event - the vault. The first four Americans posted solid scores, but Moceanu fell on both her vault landings. The final American to vault




The t-shirt exchange is always a highlight of the conference.

was Kerri Strug. Even though the vault was Kerri's strength, she landed short on her first vault and fell back twisting her ankle. At this very moment, the Russian gymnast was doing the floor event and it appeared that the Americans might lose the gold medal unless Kerri Strug could overcome the pain in her leg and ankle and make a good vault. It was one of those Olympic moments where athletes can become heros and Kerri became an Olympic hero!

She put aside the pain, gathered her determination, and stuck that vault - landing on both feet, then lifting the throbbing ankle to balance on one foot and salute the judges before falling to her knees and crawling off the floor. Her score was 9.712! Team USA won the GOLD MEDAL!

It takes a lot of dedication, determination, and discipline to be an Olympic athlete. Kerri Strug has the qualities to make her a successful Olympic athlete, but she is also a successful student. She finished high school a year early with straight As - even while undergoing the grueling training required of an Olympic

athlete. She continued that discipline as a freshman at UCLA where she earned membership in Alpha Lambda Delta. She is now a student at Stanford and we are thrilled and delighted to have her with us tonight.

After Ms. Strug's portion of the program, students

changed to informal clothes for the skit contest, which once again proved that Alpha Lambda Delta members have incredible musical and dramatic talent, as well as great senses of humor. The conference concluded on Sunday morning with presentations on *The Flame*, services offered by the National Office of Alpha Lambda Delta, ALD merchandise, and fellowships and scholarships.

Taking the Next Academic Step

Being Admitted to Graduate or Professional School

Being initiated into Alpha Lambda Delta National Society is a significant academic achievement for any student. This recognition marks an exceptional beginning of the collegiate experience - one that only a small percentage of students ever achieve. Being accepted into this honor society encourages members to explore educational and vocational opportunities, many of which may require advanced degrees and training. The information that follows offers suggestions on ways Alpha Lambda Delta members can develop a positive strategy for successful admission to post baccalaureate programs.

Oraduate admission is not predicated on chance, but on a variety of indicators which includes a positive grade point average. Successful graduate applicants should maintain the study habits and academic standards that allowed them originally to be initiated into Alpha Lambda Delta. Most graduate programs have more applicants than places in the entering class, so selection committees must choose among many qualified candidates and previous scholarship becomes a primary criteria. Often graduate and professional school admission directors share that the best indicator of future academic success is past academic success. Thus, the first goal in being admitted to a post baccalaureate program is "keeping up" the grades.

Graduate admission is seldom magical, but usually occurs because of the positive actions of individuals seeking entrance. Meet all application deadlines - the admissions committee has an easy decision to make when a file is not complete. Ensure that the application form and required application fee have been received by the institution. Check to see that other needed pieces of documentation, such as letters of reference and transcript[s], have arrived. Schedule the required admissions tests [e.g. GRE,

GMAT, LSAT, MAT, and MCAT] in time to have scores sent to the selected institutions by the decision deadline.

Graduate admission is usually not political. Caution should be exercised in requesting "titled" individuals, such as political figures, institution trustees, or "a friend of a friend," to write reference letters or to intercede with the admissions committee. Such "pressure" actions are easily identified by professional educators and many times are not helpful - perhaps this type of involvement may even be harmful to candidate's chance for entrance. Only persons who can speak to both the character and academic promise of the applicant should be used as a reference. Do not overlook your faculty adviser, the Alpha Lambda Delta adviser, favorite instructors, or the Dean as potential positive references. Another suggestion is to have a person practicing the profession that the candidate desires to enter write a letter. For example, a physician, who knows the candidate well, would be an excellent reference for medical school. Alumni of an institution or a graduate of the particular degree program to which an individual is applying also may be helpful. Most alumni are proud of their alma mater and seek

opportunities to share positive educational experiences with others.

Graduate admission is not a counting activity. Membership and active participation in campus organizations attests to the well roundedness of the applicant; however, simply joining organizations for use as resume "builders" may not be considered advantageous. Active involvement is the key. In addition to positive and selective extracurricular experiences, the admissions committee may favorably view participation in a variety of volunteer experiences, such as an "alternative spring break" or "Habitat for Humanity," as beneficial. These types of

activities assist in defining the candidate as a person. Never fail to list either part or full time employment positions, especially when the funds from these endeavors have been used to defer a portion of undergraduate educational expenses.

Graduate admission is being accepted. Identify institutions offering the desired major, and write several letters requesting information and expressing interest. Applicants should contact only those colleges or universities where they fit the published admission criteria. Applying can be both costly and time consuming. In most cases, sending applications that are not good matches is a waste of time for both the applicant and the institution; however, do not unnecessarily limit the number applications to one or two. Be reasonable but remember that to be accepted an applicant must apply. Include a detailed personal resume with the initial contact. This document allows the admissions representative to match academic achievements, personal skills and co-curricular experiences with the profile of their expected entering class. Ensure that all educational prerequisites have been taken or will be finalized prior to graduation. Develop a positive relationship with the graduate admissions personnel. Personal interaction allows the institutional representative to gauge such items as verbal skills, professional demeanor, motivation, and creativity items that cannot be measured by a standardized test. Admission professionals can "open doors" for deserving applicants. Remember that most graduate majors are offered in both the private and tax-supported sectors of higher education. Review colleges and universities in both groups. In general, private institutions are more expensive, but many offer greater financial assistance than their taxsupported counterparts.

Graduate admission is a personal matter. Remember that the job of the graduate admissions counselor is to recruit the "best" individuals for the entering class. The task of the candidate for admission is to supply information to aid the institutional representative in accomplishing this goal. Be honest identify both strengths and weaknesses, but dwell in strengths. Visit the campus and "picture" yourself as a student at the institution. Talk to faculty and students in addition to the admissions personnel. Ask questions concerning the academic program, the institutional and community environment, the success of the graduates, as well as seek information on scholarship, assistantship,

and fellowship options. When on campus, dress for success. Consider an appointment for graduate admission as an employment interview. Follow-up with handwritten thank you notes, and "stay in touch" during the remainder of the decision-making period. Other than the thank you notes, all other communication with the institution should be typed unless certain data are specifically asked to be in a hand written form. Having word processing skills is a "must" for success in modern graduate education. Always use "correct" English in all written and spoken interactions. Serious candidates for graduate and professional schools should make initial contacts early in their junior year.

Alpha Lambda Delta scholars began the undergraduate experience as academic successes. By continuing high academic achievement and being involved in campus activities, honor society members should be excellent candidates for graduate and professional schools. As stated earlier, admission is not magical - admission success is hard work coupled with common sense. The hope of the Society is that these ideas will aid in focusing on the necessary tasks required for admission to post baccalaureate programs. Graduate admission is achieved by those students who remain academically superior, meet required deadlines, and present themselves in a "polished" and professional manner. Alpha Lambda Delta is pleased to be a part of the collegiate experience that encourages and promotes academic excellence. Best wishes during this wonderful and rewarding educational and vocational journey.

Originally, this award was established to give collegiate chapters of the society an annual opportunity to reward an outstanding sophomore member of Alpha Lambda Delta with a stipend of \$150.

Beginning this year, the National Council will offer at least 26 Jo Anne J. Trow Undergraduate Scholarships of \$1000 each! Applications for this undergraduate scholarship will be mailed to each chapter in January 2000. Each chapter may submit one application (chapters initiating 150-299 members may submit two applications and chapters initiating 300+ members in the past year may submit three applications).



Alpha Lambda Delta commits its resources to recognizing, encouraging and rewarding academic achievement. Since membership dues provide the major source of revenue to support the programs and services of Alpha Lambda Delta, the National Council is pleased to report to the members and advisers on the Society's financial operations.


Since its founding in 1924, Alpha Lambda Delta has concentrated on two major programs: honoring outstanding freshman scholars and awarding fellowships to members for graduate and professional study. From 1940 until 1986 current membership dues funded the fellowships, and the National Council placed all surplus funds into investment programs earmarked to support the fellowship program. Since 1986 the fellowships have been funded by income on investments in the Fellowships and Loan Fund. Since the establishment of the program, close to 400 Alpha Lambda Delta members have received almost \$1,000,000 in fellowships.

With the establishment of four new fellowships, Alpha Lambda Delta will award twenty scholarships annually.





U.S. COAST GUARD ACADEMY

he U. S. Coast Guard Academy, situated on the banks of the Thames River in southeast Connecticut, is both a highly selective four-year military college, offering bachelor of science degrees in eight majors, and a military training facility. The U. S. Coast Guard Academy was established in 1876 to prepare young men (women were admitted in 1976) for the rigorous and challenging life of a Coast Guard Officer. Whereas its sister academies, the Military, Air Force, Merchant Marine, and Naval Academies, provide only a small percentage of career officers for their parent organizations, the Coast Guard Academy provides at least half of the Coast Guard's officer corps and, therefore, is the wellspring of Coast Guard culture.

Serving as a Military College is the central mission of the Coast Guard Academy and as such it is dedicated to producing Coast Guard Officers for the Coast Guard. Within this broad perspective lie four primary objectives.

To provide:

- (1) by precept and example an environment which encourages honor, loyalty, and obedience,
- (2) a sound undergraduate education in a field of interest to the Coast Guard,
- (3) a living laboratory for leadership education, and
- (4) training which enables graduates to assume their immediate duties as junior officers afloat.

To ensure that we accomplish this goal and to provide the best education possible, several years ago the intellectual and physical job demands of Coast Guard Officers were analyzed by the faculty and a set of Military College Outcomes were created. These outcomes are also congruent with the developmental experiences for which the Coast Guard Academy is responsible and are shared by the Academic, Commandant of Cadets (Dean of

Students), and Athletic Divisions. They include developing competent leaders who are able to think critically, acquire, integrate, and expand knowledge, and who communicate effectively. It is our intention that the four years cadets spend at the Coast Guard Academy be only the beginning of their professional development as leaders and career Coast Guard Officers. To further our objectives, we practice Leadership Across The Curriculum, which mandates that all faculty address leadership issues in their courses whenever possible. Leadership education takes place in the classroom, the barracks, the athletic field, and in extracurricular experiences.

With hopes of affiliating with Alpha Lambda Delta, Lambda Delta, a 4/C honor society was chartered during the fall semester 1998 with thirty-one cadets. The charter members of Lambda Delta wanted to affiliate with Alpha Lambda Delta because they believed that they could benefit by networking with students at other colleges and welcomed the external validation for their achievement at the Coast Guard Academy that national affiliation brings.

On 19 April 1999, the U. S. Coast Guard Academy became the first U. S. Service Academy to initiate and install a chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta. Thirty-one 3/C cadets (sophomores) were initiated as charter members at a dinner ceremony held in the Officer's Club of the Coast Guard Academy. Dr. William McKee, Vice President of Cumberland University and Member of the National Executive Board of Alpha Lambda Delta, officiated at the installation of the Coast Guard Academy's chapter.

After comments by ADM Douglas Teeson, Superintendent of the Coast Guard Academy (President of the college); Dr. Haas, Academic Dean; and CAPT Brooks, Commandant of Cadets (Dean of Students), Dr. Irving King, Professor of History, gave the after dinner speech. His topic "George Washington's Coast Guard" was well received by the audience of faculty and students.

Cadets eagerly await the initiation of new members that will occur in the fall. They also have several plans for the next year including working with CGA's Film Club on a Coast Guard in Film series, assisting CGA's International Cadet Club with their

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International Fair, and hosting a series of luncheons dedicated to the history of the Coast Guard. Additionally, they plan to visit a museum or two and work at the local soup kitchen.

Ms. Betty Jo Hudson addressed the students, parents, and advisers who gathered for the initiation and presentation of the Order of the Torch. A former Alpha Lambda Delta National President and Ohio State Chapter Adviser, Ms. Hudson was honored this summer with the establishment of the "Betty Jo Hudson Fellowship" for graduate studies.

LEADERSHIP FOR THE FUTURE

ORGANIZATION

Alpha Lambda Delta is a national society that honors academic excellence during a student's first year in college. Founded as an honor society for freshman women at the University of Illinois in 1924, Alpha Lambda Delta became a national organization as chapters were established at Purdue in 1926 and at DePauw in 1927. Its purpose is to encourage superior academic achievement among students in their first year in institutions of higher education, to promote intelligent living and a continued high standard of learning, and to assist women and men in recognizing and developing meaningful goals for their roles in society.

STRUCTURE

Alpha Lambda Delta has more than 220 chapters throughout the nation, and more than 575,000 students have been initiated. The society consists of active members, alumni, honorary members, faculty advisers, administrative advisers, and its governing body - the National Council. The National Headquarters, located in Macon, Georgia, is staffed by an executive director and several assistants. The ALD Web site is www.mercer.edu/ald. Business of the organization is conducted at the annual meeting of the National Council, whose members include elected officers as well as professional and student representatives.

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Chapter activities vary from campus to campus. Each chapter is expected to initiate new members at least once a year and to fulfill certain minimum essentials of business. Other activities usually encourage, honor, and publicize scholarship among students. Many chapters also sponsor and/or participate in service projects on their campus or in the community. Chapters compete for the prestigious Order of the Torch Awards.

LEADERSHIP

Students may participate in Alpha Lambda Delta at the national level in addition to serving as campus chapter officers. Three

members represent the students at the annual National Council meeting, serve on committees, and work with campus chapters, professional council members, and council officers throughout their terms.

INSIGNIA

Alpha Lambda Delta's official symbol is a gold candle with its Greek letters superimposed on the candle holder. The society honor key and lapel pin depict this symbol. Colors of the society are red, gold, and white. The coat of arms is a gold-bordered black shield with a red-tipped white candle, above which is a white altar with an open book on it.

DIDIDIS

Each new member pays \$15 national dues. Initiates receive a certificate of membership and a key or lapel pin. The local chapter sets its own dues. Members may purchase T-shirts, honor cords, and caps from National Headquarters.

AWARDS

Sophomore members may compete for 26 Jo Anne J. Trow Scholarships that provide \$1000 to each recipient.

In honor of Maria Leonard, founder of the society, a Book Award is presented to the Alpha Lambda Delta graduating senior in each chapter who has achieved the highest cumulative GPA.

Senior Certificates, available from National Headquarters, may be presented to graduating members who have maintained the cumulative GPA required for membership.

FELLOWSHIPS

The National Council awards nineteen fellowships in the amount of \$3000 and the Maria Leonard Fellowship in the amount of \$5000 annually for one year of graduate study. Any initiated member of Alpha Lambda Delta who has maintained the academic qualification for membership is eligible to apply as a graduating senior or later. An endowment provides major funding for these fellowships.
