# Alpha Lambda Delta Meets in Salt Lake City, Utah

n June 21, 2001, the National Council of Alpha Lambda Delta met in Salt Lake City, Utah, to conduct the annual business of the society. Dr. Patricia Graham welcomed everyone and introduced new Members-at-Large Jonathan Hovda, University of North Dakota, Susan Huffman, Purdue University, and Marva Watlington, North Carolina A&T State University, who were installed as Council members. Dr. Graham proudly reflected on the past year in which ALD rose to the challenge of increasing membership and dealing with other issues facing honor societies across the country. She remarked that ALD's proactive stance has been quite successful.

Dr. Glenda Earwood-Smith, Executive Director, echoed Dr. Graham's excitement noting that membership had increased 18.8% over last year and that over 60 chapters increased their memberships by over 25%. Dr. Earwood-Smith reported on the success of two strategies implemented by the New Challenges Task Force. The Task Force was established by the National Council to study recruitment policies of honor societies and their impact on ALD membership and to develop strategies for increasing enrollment in ALD. One of these strategies was a targeted mailing for ten selected schools. ALD partnered with Phi Eta Sigma in three of those schools that have joint membership chapters. Another strategy implemented was the Chapter Challenge that offered an incentive of waiving leadership conference fees for any chapter which increased its membership by 25%. Finally, the "Best Practices" mailing was initiated in November. The Council voted to continue the Task Force for an additional year, focusing on chapter yield.

Attention to recruitment will be important as Alpha Lambda Delta increases its dues this year by \$5.00. The Council approved a system to recognize chapters that increase their membership by 10%, 25%, and 50%. Those schools will achieve a bronze, silver, and gold rating respectively and will be honored in next year's FLAME.

Dr. Earwood-Smith warned that other concerns challenge honor societies nationally: a trend toward aggressive and questionable recruitment tactics, the unethical formation of "bogus" honor societies and potential trademark infringement, and changes occurring in the structure of the Association of College Honor

Societies.

Though fellowship fund investments decreased in value this past year, the National Office is again to be commended for operating efficiently and frugally and for generating a significant surplus in the general operating fund. The Council voted to put most of the surplus into the Fellowships fund and to increase both the number and amounts of scholarships and fellowships for the year 2002-2003 as follows:

- ~35 JoAnn Trow scholarships
- ~Maria Leonard Fellowship Award of \$7,500
- ~7 Fellowship awards of \$5,000
- ~15 Fellowship awards of \$3000

One of the \$5000 fellowships will be named for Dr. Martha G. Wade, Vice President for Finance and Long Range Planning. Margie announced her retirement at the Council meeting, having served on the Council for 14 years. Margie's wisdom and guidance have placed ALD in excellent financial condition and have enabled the organization to focus its mission on the achievements and support of students. Margie saw the Fellowship Fund reach \$1 million in 1995, and she has been instrumental in helping it grow to over the \$2 million mark in 2001!! As then Executive Director Barbara Quilling said in the 1996 issue of the FLAME, "The fellowship program is the earliest program started by the society and the one in which the Council and Chapter Advisors take the most pride." THANK YOU, MARGIE, FOR YOUR DEDICATION AND LEADERSHIP TO ALPHA LAMBDA DELTA!

Other sad partings and warm welcomes have occurred in ALD recently. As a matter of fact, Dr. Earwood-Smith

Here's What Your Fellow ALD Members Are Doing ...

Ryan R. Stickel entered the University of South Carolina in the fall of 2000, utilizing benefits from his service in the United States Navy. He is a Resident Advisor for University Housing, the Membership Education Chairman in his fraternity and a Midshipman in the Navy/Marine Corp ROTC.

In the spring of 2001, he was inducted in Alpha Lambda Delta Freshman Honor Society and placed third in the Mr. USC Bodybuilding Championships. In 2001, Ryan also won the USC Octathlon, an eight-sport challenge of strength, skill, and endurance events in one afternoon.

Last summer, Ryan was an ocean lifeguard on the Outer Banks of North Carolina. His Ocean Rescue team won the Outer Banks Olympics last summer. The previous three summers he had worked Ocean Rescue on the beaches of Florida. He performed numerous lifesaving rescues, a few of which took place in rough, stormy waters during hurricane season.

In October 2001, Ryan was volunteering on a community service project with other students to clear paths in an overgrown forest. In a potentially fatal accident, the student next to Ryan lost control of his machinery, slicing Ryan in the arm and stomach, deep enough that it was an eighth of an inch away from his intestines. Ryan's extensive training in First Aid and First Responder techniques enabled him to react quickly enough to save his own life. Ryan assessed his injuries, applied direct pressure with a spare tee shirt, walked a half-mile through the woods, and secured a ride to the nearest hospital.

Ryan has returned to class a bit slower but still excelling in his studies, activities, and attitude. Although physical exercise is against doctor's orders right now, he plans to resume his triathlon training and bodybuilding in January of 2002.

Ryan exemplifies Alpha Lambda Delta's ideals of character, scholarship, and service. He is a person of high caliber who has learned from his lessons and has utilized his keen mind and training. The FLAME is proud to present this hero's story and wishes him a speedy recovery and continued success.



## Be an Imagineer

Darla Banfi, the Administrative Advisor of the University of Wisconsin - Platteville chapter, is the 2001 Advisor of the Year. The following is the address that she gave during the 2001 National Leadership Workshop in Orlando, Florida.

his afternoon, we all enjoyed seeing a bit of Orlando, either by going to Wet 'N Wild Waterpark, to shops on International Drive, or to Universal Studios. Because we are in Orlando, noted for its family entertainment, I have chosen for the topic of my speech tonight the challenge to be an Imagineer.

I'm sure that when many of you were young, you enjoyed watching "Disney's Wonderful World of Color." I don't think we're ever too old to enjoy a Disney movie. I recently saw a television special about Walt Disney's life. You are probably aware that 2001 would have been his 100th birthday. In this TV special, many people gave tribute to him. In those testimonials, I was intrigued by a job title shared by many of his employees. Their title was "Imagineer".

I had never heard the term Imagineer before, so I began to do some research. I soon found over 2,500 web sites with a reference to the words Disney Imagineers. I guess I should have just asked my daughter first, because when I had my speech all done, she told me, "oh yeah, mom, I've heard of Imagineers-I've seen "Imagineer That" on the Disney channel." Ah, the knowledge of the Internet and children-it's very humbling. Well, I didn't re-write my speech-I'm hoping that the term Imagineer is new for some of you, like it was for me.

Most of the information about Imagineers I'll share with you this evening comes from a two-part article by David J. Fisher which was published in The Disney Magazine entitled "So You Want to Be an Imagineer."

According to Fisher, "Walt Disney created 'imagineering' by hand picking some of his studio's finest creative and technical talents to work on an idea that would revolutionize family entertainment. That select group became 'Imagineers,' a name to describe their unique skills of combining imagination and engineering. Their first assignment was the planning, designing, and construction of Disneyland, which opened in California in 1955."

For the Walt Disney Corporation, the Imagineers are its creative arm. Because of their innovative and inquisitive nature, they like to jump right into a project. They are

both the dreamers and the doers.

Walt Disney defined Imagineers as having the 4 C's: curiosity, confidence, courage and constancy. Please don't think that only engineers are hired for these jobs because actually imagineers are hired from more than 150 different disciplines. Sometimes it is their talent or education that gets them a job. But sometimes, it's just

because they are in the right place at the right time. Imagineers work in a challenging and creative environment that allows them to create an idea and take it through all of the stages of production.

Now, let's think about your role in Alpha Lambda Delta and see how in many ways, officers and advisors of ALD are Imagineers.

The Disney Imagineers estimate that an idea might take only 1% of the time of a project. The other 99% of the time is spent taking that idea and making it become a reality. Would you agree? In Sue and Bridget's session this morning we heard the same thing-projects are 1% inspiration and 99% perspiration. Think of your chapter activities—often when a brand new idea is decided upon, such as a food drive or a college bowl competition, then the REAL work begins of making that project happen. We can appreciate the value of the person who was the dreamer and came up with a great idea, but we also must appreciate the value of delegating jobs and checking on progress so that the project actually happens.

The Disney Imagineers are able to work with a sense of complete freedom. The multiple talents of each person are highly valued. There actually seems to be a blurring of people's roles as they work on a project. I would compare this with the work that you officers do. Electing officers is often challenging. Sometimes it seems to become more of a popularity contest. After the advisors

and officers have begun working on a project, it may become evident that someone is in a position for which they may not be well-suited. You may find that this requires a blurring of roles. For example, jobs traditionally done by the secretary may be better handled, in some instances, by the vice president, and so on. I would encourage you to be flexible as you approach project and committee work.

Disney Imagineers are said to represent the complete range of personalities. According to David Fischer, "Some are risk takers; some keep the rules. Some are the dreamers; others are the doers. Some think big; others love the details." If we think about our chapters, we would also find this to be true. We should celebrate the unique personality of each officer and member. Chapters should capitalize on these talents and differences. You will find that your chapter can achieve so much by work-

ing together in a collaborative environment.

All of us in this room this evening share the fact that we have lived in two millenniums, with one foot in the past and one foot in the future. Now granted, your foot is not back into the past millennium as far as mine is! I'm going to give away my age by telling you that I attended a one-room grade school which had no indoor plumbingjust outdoor gravity toilets. We even had a crank telephone, which I'm sure you've seen only in museums! I would never have dreamed that within my 47 years I would have seen so many changes. Just looking at education alone, I have experienced attending a country school. then working as a high school teacher, then helping college students see the world through a study abroad experience, and now I am working in the new field of Distance Learning where complete degrees can be earned online. Could I have imagined such change? No, I really could not have. My personality is more suited to taking an idea (sometime my own idea, sometimes others' ideas) and running with it. I'm a doer who likes the details. So, for me, keeping an open mind and embracing change have allowed me to be an Imagineer.

Marty Sklar, the President of Walt Disney Imagineering, encourages budding Imagineers to "Try as many things as you can, see as many places as you can, learn as much about everything as you can." Now, let's think about how this is similar to the goals of Alpha Lambda Delta. Through your chapter activities, you are encouraged to learn as much as you can. The National ALD office also does its part to encourage you to see as many places as you can by providing the wonderful opportunity of this conference which occurs annually in great cities across the nation.

A man named Herbert Ryman was responsible for the concept of Disneyland and for designing many of its attractions. Marty Sklar, the President of Walt Disney Imagineering said, "it was often very frustrating because it seemed that Ryman took longer to do an illustration than any other artist. But the truth of the matter was that Ryman would research his ideas so well, that once he started to paint, he knew exactly what he was doing. It seemed like nobody could work faster or nail a concept better than Ryman once he had taken the time to understand and research the problem or idea." As we work together as a chapter, it is important that as ideas are discussed and jobs are delegated, that the officers and committee chairs understand what they are being asked to do. Time will be saved in the long run if we make sure that we know where we are going.

I'd like to close with another quote from Marty Sklar. He says, "It is not enough to be a dreamer. You also have to have the energy, enthusiasm, and expertise to carry though on your dreams."

I'd like you to imagine what lies in your future, both as you finish college and as you enter the work force! As we learned last night from John Spence, 65% of you will retire from jobs that we have not yet ever heard about! It doesn't matter how small or how large your dream is. If you can see it, you can believe in it. I challenge you to be an Imagineer — to use your education and your energy to turn your dreams into reality.  $AA\Delta$

he Jo Anne J. Trow Award was started in 1988 to honor a past National President of Alpha Lambda Delta. Former Vice President for Student Services at Oregon State University, Dr. Jo Anne Trow served Alpha Lambda Delta as District VIII Advisor from 1974 to 1979, Secretary from 1979 to 1983, President-Elect from 1984 to 1985, and as National President from 1985 to 1988. During her term as President, the National Council was restructured to provide a more streamlined operation. Originally, this award was established to give collegiate chapters an annual opportunity to reward an outstanding sophomore member of Alpha Lambda Delta with a stipend of \$150.

This year, the National Council will offer at least 35 Jo Anne J. Trow Undergraduate Scholarships of \$1000 each! Applications for this undergraduate scholarship are available from your chapter advisor in January 2002. Each chapter may submit one application (chapters initiating 150-299 members may submit two applications and chapters initiating 300+ members in the past year may submit three applications).



# Alpha Lambda Delta Honors the 2001-2002 Graduate Fellowship Scholars

Beginning in 2002, Alpha Lambda Delta Honor Society for First Year Students will award a total of 23 fellowships - fifteen \$3000 fellowships, seven \$5000 fellowships and the Maria Leonard Fellowship in the amount of \$7500. These scholarships are awarded annually for one year of graduate study. Any initiated member of Alpha Lambda Delta who has maintained the academic qualifications for membership is eligible to apply for fellowship consideration as a graduating senior or later. An endowment provides funding for these fellowships. Members of the National Council serve on a selection committee, review applications, and award the fellowships each year.



consecutive summers of wellsupervised, challenging internships, a series of enriching seminars, a generous financial award, and a laptop computer. Fellows are encouraged in their internships to work in two of the three economic sectors: government, nonprofit and/or enterprise or business sectors during their first two summers. The third summer offers an option for an international internship through partnerships with Save the Children in countries such as Bolivia, Malawi and Ethiopia, as well as with the Peggy Guggenheim Collection in Venice, Italy.

The Jeannette K. Watson Fellowship was awarded to sophomore Joel Mentor, a political science major in Long Island University's Honors Program. He interned this summer at the Citizen's Committee for New York City, a non-profit organization that provides leadership training and resources for volunteer community groups throughout the city. Joel organized and conducted a seminar for the Youth Leadership Institute, helping young New Yorkers become inspiring leaders in their communities.

Joel joins junior Cheryl Williams and senior Raynal Jaboiun who were appointed Watson fellows last year. Cheryl's second summer placement was in the Office of Corporate Communications at The McGraw-Hill Companies. Raynal worked in the Mutual Funds office at the Bank of New York. 

The Alpha Lambda Delta chapter at Mount Union College is sending over \$1000 to the American Red Cross Disaster Fund. In response to the Attack on America on Tuesday, September 11, the chapter decided to collect money for the American Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund in an effort called, "Help Us Help Others."

The Red Cross disaster relief focuses on meeting people's immediate needs. In the wake of a disaster, the Red Cross provides shelter, food, and health and mental health services to address basic human needs. ALD Textbook Exchange is a brand new program that our chapter at **Ohio University** introduced this academic year. It is to assist ALD members with seeking cheaper second-hand textbooks within ALD.

With the ALD Textbook Exchange, students will save money on textbooks and be able to spend money alternatively on computer and sports equipment, more reference books, food, etc. Buyers can benefit from at least a 30% discount on all textbooks sold by other members. Sellers can also enjoy the 70% buyback guarantee. The community can also take advantage of the program. Each participating ALD member will pay a \$1 fee that will be donated to the local community.

The program is easy to implement. At the beginning of every quarter, we will email all members informing

them about the program. Members will be notified that there will be a price ceiling of 70% of the original price. Interested members will use a form in Excel format attached in the email to fill in information about the textbooks (title, author, edition, class number etc), as well as their personal contact information. All the data will be received electronically. We will then start sorting out data and doing the math. Information will be copied and pasted on a final list in the order of class numbers. The list will be posted online three weeks before the conclusion of the quarter. Interested members will personally contact whomever they wish to purchase the textbooks.

So far over 50 members are participating. We have successfully gathered over 150 textbooks on our list. Members are very pleased. They have given us positive feedback saying that this program would help them a lot.







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## **ORGANIZATION**

Alpha Lambda Delta is a national society that honors academic excellence during a student's first year in college. Founded as an honor society for freshman women at the University of Illinois in 1924, Alpha Lambda Delta became a national organization as chapters were established at Purdue in 1926 and at DePauw in 1927. It became co-ed in 1979 in response to Title IX. Its purpose is to encourage superior academic achievement among students in their first year in institutions of higher education, to promote intelligent living and a continued high standard of learning, and to assist women and men in recognizing and developing meaningful goals for their roles in society.

### STRUCTURE

Alpha Lambda Delta has more than 225 chapters throughout the nation, and more than 600,000 students have been initiated. The society consists of active members. alumni, honorary members, faculty advisors, administrative advisors, and its governing body – the National Council. The National Headquarters, located in Macon, Georgia, is staffed by an Executive Director and several assistants. The ALD web site is www.mercer.edu/ald. Business of the organization is conducted at the annual meeting of the National Council, whose members include elected officers as well as professional and student representatives.

### **CHAPTERS**

Chapter activities vary from campus to campus. Each chapter is expected to initiate new members at least once a year and to fulfill certain minimum essentials of business. Other activities usually encourage, honor, and publicize scholarship among students. Many chapters also sponsor and/or participate in service projects on their campus or in the community. Chapters compete for the prestigious Order of the Torch Awards.

### **LEADERSHIP**

Students may participate in Alpha Lambda Delta at the national level in addition to serving as campus chapter officers. Three members represent the students at the annual National Council meeting, serve on committees, and work with campus chapters, professional council members, and council officers throughout their terms.

### INSIGNIA

Alpha Lambda Delta's official symbol is a gold candle with its Greek letters superimposed on the candle holder. The society honor key and lapel pin depict this symbol. Colors of the society are red, gold, and white. The coat of arms is a gold-bordered black shield with a red-tipped white candle, above which is a white altar with an open book on it.

### **FEES**

Each new member pays \$20 national dues. Initiates receive a certificate of membership and a key or lapel pin. The local chapter sets its own dues. Members may purchase T-shirts, honor cords, and caps from National Headquarters.

### **AWARDS**

Sophomore members may compete for 35 Jo Anne J. Trow Scholarships that provide \$1000 to each recipient.

In honor of Maria Leonard, founder of the society, a Book Award is presented to the Alpha Lambda Delta graduating senior in each chapter who has achieved the highest cumulative GPA. Senior Certificates, available from National Headquarters, may be presented to graduating members who have maintained the cumulative GPA required for membership.

### **FELLOWSHIPS**

The National Council awards fifteen fellowships in the amount of \$3000, seven fellowships in the amount of \$5000, and the Maria Leonard Fellowship in the amount of \$7500 annually for one year of graduate study. Any initiated member of Alpha Lambda Delta who has maintained the academic qualification for membership is eligible to apply as a graduating senior or later. An endowment provides major funding for these fellowships.
